Of the above we know the following:

Whitlock, Capt. George Frederic Ashford Whitlock (1868-1936), the son of George Frederick Tod & Laura (Vellacott) Whitlock. Mayor of Barnstaple, Devon, 1928-1929 a descendant of the Whitlocks of Ottery St. Mary, Devon, family.

Whitelock, Wm. Edmund (1801-1868) married Mary Ann Drage at Molesworth, Huntingdonshire in 1818. We show four children including a son William Edmond Whitelock b.1825. As early as 1847 shown as Linendraper of 166 Strand. Not sure of parents but his mother may have been Sarah Twigg.

Whitlock Bros. Mark Peter Whitlock comments in a recent letter "In the 1861 Post Office Directory however, Mark and his two brothers, the twins George and Francis, all three of whom traded later as Whitlock Bros, are shown as Cheesemongers, as is a Robert, who may be another brother." These brothers were the children of George & Henrietta (Holden) Whitlock part of the Whitlocks of Oxfordshire family.

Whitlock Henry This is the Henry son of Robert & Charlotte Whitlock who married Mary Maria Kamph in 1829 at St.Bride's, Fleet St. It is assumed Robert Whitlock was the founder of the Coach business in 1778 although it was Henry whose name carried down the present day. This is the family that in the early 1900's produced the Whitlock car. See previous articles Vol.10:No.4:pg3 also 4:3:2, 7:1:8, 8:4:1 & 9:3:6
