This issue signals the return to having more pictures in the Newsletter. I have finally resolved the problems I was having with scanner and hopefully I will be able to use more of the pictures that have been sent in.

I did have some problems with the Main Lines in the last issue. The one for Dave Guiel was in the September issue as well and the one for Louis Smith had a mistake in it. I will print the corrected version Louis Smith's Main Line in the June issue. Future issues will be more accurate.

As usual there are some interesting additions. The Civil War papers for George E. Whitlock (R2427) provide great detail about him. The physical description includes height, colour of hair, eyes etc. The record also details that he was given a disability discharge in 1863 for a spinal curvature, a "marked hereditary disposition to phthisis" (TB) and extreme youth. He was only 15!! George was persistent and entered (age "18") as a substitute for Robert B. Sherman in 1864. He was discharged in Charleston in April 1866 still age 18. Our thanks to Peg Tullloch for this item.

The Union College information from 1813-1816 sent in by James E. Wilson gives interesting details about schooling in the early 1800's (R2435). These records refer to Aaron Whitlock of Fairfield, Ct who married Esther Ketchum in 1801 as Aaron C. Whitlock. We had not seen the "C" before.

The information from Thomas Glassel on the Deerfield, Massachusetts massacre of Feb.29,1704 (X5372) details the descendants of Joseph & Hannah (Whitlock) Baldwin (M1636) who died at that time or who were taken as captives to Quebec. Many Quebec families descend from children who were taken as captives during this time period and stayed in Quebec and married into the french families. I am only just starting to uncover the ones that descend from Hannah Whitlock.

The GenForum item (X5393) from Sheri Millikin details the descendants of William Austin born about 1700 in Wales. Descendants in Virginia include a lot of familiar names that show in our VALAND file (includes every reference in our files to the Whitlocks of Virginia pre-1800). Names include Austin, Pollard and Timberlake.

Sher Leetooze (X5399) is currently writing a book on the Bible Christian Ministers who served in the Canadian Conference. I sent her the information on Rev Jesse Whitlock (1824-1913) of PEI as well as Thomas Whitlock (1806-1875) of St.Mary's, Ontario who was a Bible Christian lay preacher.

I was interested to see a GenForum message (X5406) from Maureen Scurfield regarding a portrait in her possession of Judge John Augustus Mathison. Judge Mathison was born in London in 1781 and died in Hudson, Quebec in 1868. He married Harriet Vanderburgh the daughter of Peter & Anna (Whitlock) Vanderburgh. Harriet is recorded as the beautiful American cousin of Capt John Whitlock of the Queen's Rangers. Judge Mathison was active during the Rebellion of 1837. His daughter Ann Eliza Amelia Mathison married William Coley Whitlock (1787-1875) one of the persons her father had imprisoned during the Rebellion. William Coley Whitlock was a brother to Anna Whitlock so was therefore a brother to his wife's grandmother!! Just before her death in 1916 Ann Eliza Amelia (Mathison) Whitlock's land in Hudson, Quebec became and still is the Whitlock Golf and Country Club. Unfortunately I was not able to contact Maureen Scurfield as her email address had changed.

Lawrence Otis's collection of Canadian census records (X5408,X5409) includes the family of Mary A. Whitlock who married George Smart. On the 1881 census Mary A. Whitlock is shown born in Quebec about 1836. When Jessie Smart marries John McAdam in 1892, Simcoe Co., Ontario she is shown as the daughter of George Smart and Mary Whitlock. In the marriage record of Albert Holstock and Margaret Smart in 1874 (X5436) Margaret shows as the daughter of George Smart and Mary Ann Whitlock (illeg). This may indicate that Mary Ann's mother may have been the Whitlock not her father.

The only Whitlocks I show living in Quebec in the 1830's are the loyalist families detailed on the WHITLOCK09 chart but there is no Mary Ann Whitlock. I will be interested to learn more about this family.

Harry Lee Whitlock's details (X5410) on the descendants of Jonathan Johnson & Rebecca (Wheeler) Whiflock (M1839) of Washington Co., Tennessee added great new detail to the WHITLOCK25 chart.

The details from Judith Allison Walters (X5414) on the Hoggatt family of Virginia led to additional information being uncovered and resulted in an article in this issue on the Whitlock/Hoggatt connections.

One of the best finds listed in this issue has to the information from Nancy Ann Webb McLaughlin (X5417). Nancy is in the process of putting a book together on the Webb family and her information includes a birth year for the Susannah Webb who married Thomas Whitlock in 1788 Campbell, Virginia. She shows Susannah born 1767 in Virginia, the daughter of John Webb. As the Webb and Whitlock families are so intertwined and move west together, I am looking forward to Nancy's book.

There are several references to information (X5421,X5449,X5458) from Eric Whitlock and his research into the Whitlocks of Devizes, Wiltshire. Back in the early 1970's I saw numerous references to Devizes and had always wished to do more research into these families and their connection to the Whitlocks of Pitton, Wiltshire. Eric's work has pushed the WHITLOCK69 chart back a couple more generations and I am sure further research will determine other Wiltshire families connect to this line as well. It has been a long time since someone sent in so many 18th century baptisms that were not in our files!! Our thanks to Eric for sharing this research.

Emily Griffith's information (X5429) provides tantalizing clues that Lemuel Whitlock b.1799? in South Carolina might connect to the WHITLOCK33 chart. See article in this issue.

Our thanks to Wilfred Whitlock for his papers (X5433) detailing his experiences during WWII. This type of personal stories are great and I always appreciate being able to add them to our files.

David Botting's information (X5434) on his descent from John Whitlock Smale adds great detail on the family of Jonas Smale and Sally Whitlock who were married at Black Torrington, Devon Jul.12,1835.

I am looking forward to sharing research with Buck Camp who is researching the Faucett family of Union Co., South Carolina. (X5442)(X5457).

Matt Evans' details (X5446) on the Whitlock Mine of Mariposa Co. California are included in an article in this issue. This article raises interesting questions about Thomas Jefferson Whitlock (1809-1895) of Green Co., Missouri.

Elsie Whitlock's research into the Whitlocks of Kennebec, Frontenac Co., Ontario (X5465) has shown there is another Whitlock family in Ontario in the 1840's that we have not yet been able to connect. George and Mary (Wood) Whitlock's son George is shown born in Kennebec or Sheffield, Ontario about 1844.

Lawrence Otis's collection from the Ontario archives continues with more certificates (CERT808-819). Thanks also to Trevor Whitlock for the collection of certificates (CERT820-823) from the family of Christopher Whitlock and Ann Coad who were married in Liskeard, Cornwall in 1869 before emigrating to Australia.

I have just started to go through Doris Bramlett's 1,000 page plus book *The Jones Family & Descendants of William and Mary Whitlock Jones 1735-2003*. This adds a huge section to the WHITLOCK25 chart and is going to take me some time to record. Our thanks to Doris for this momentous job. (See Doris' Main Line in this issue)

Our collection of Newspaper clippings continues to grow as well. Our thanks to everyone who sent in clips, both old and new and thanks to all of you who shared your research.

I have enclosed renewal forms for those of you who haven't renewed for 2005 and I hope you will be willing to do so. We have about 100 subscriptions to date. Hopefully more will come in over the next few weeks.

WHITLOCK MINE, MARIPOSA, CA

I received an email recently that said “I’m the owner of the Whitlock mine in Mariposa Co. California and I’m looking for any info. you might have on it. Also I will share my info with you But I will have to mail it I have too much to list. Thanks, Matt Evans” Needless to say I was intrigued!!

One of the items Matt Evans sent was from the *California Gold Camps*, published 1975:

“East of Bear Valley, on the south side of the Merced River and well above it, shown on Butler’s map, 1851, and on later maps. Mining started in 1849. One of the first outbreaks against Mexicans occurred here. The men who were driven out were apparently the Sonorans employed by the discoverers Thomas J. Whitlock. The reliable Daniel Woods tells the following story of the discovery. Whitlock and party discovered the deposit accidentally and took out \$30,000 from a small square spot of ground. When they went to Monterey to deposit the gold, two sailors overheard them, took a furlough of seven weeks, followed the Whitlocks, and returned to their ship with 90 pounds of gold.

Woods himself mined here in November, 1849, but was disappointed with the results. However, he met an old sailor who had kicked away an old stone and found underneath it a nugget worth \$500.

A similar lucky find is reported in the Mariposa Chronicle: The Thomas Whitlock Company found a nugget of almost 86 ounces with only a little quartz; it had been thrown away because it was covered by a black mineral substance. In a letter of September 1852, Whitlock, who had a claim here, speaks of successful operations with little outlay. “

From the *Mariposa Gazette* January 27,1883:

“As early as 1850, I knew of the existence of gold-bearing quartz veins or lodes on Sherlock’s and Whitlock’s creeks, but as my Mexican and Chilean miners were giving me good returns from the placer claim I had bought from the Texas company, I was but little interested in the repeated declarations of my Mexicans that the veins were rich. Finally, at the conclusion of the Indian War of 1851, a party of Mexicans came up to work for me, and camped opposite my log cabin by the outcropping of what is known as the Diltz mine. Those men were experienced miners, and finding rich pocket specimens disintegrated from the vein, they traced it over the hill into Sherlock’s Gulch, finding “color” in nearly all the dirt taken from the vein. They further declared their belief that it was the mother vein of supply to the rich diggings in the gulch itself. Another party came later, and induced me to turn out all my men, some thirty at the time, to hunt for a “cavern of gold,” as it was described, said to have been found on the south side of Sherlock’s Gulch, but lost again in the dense thicket, in fleeing from the grizzlies. The tale seemed a little cranky, but my men appeared to believe in the honesty of our boy informant, and we toiled up and down that mountain side in line of battle, taking close observation till every foot of the surface was explored.

Our search resulted in the discovery of a vein of quartz, running nearly parallel with the gulch, but no pit, hole or cavern, and when the non existence of such a place was made evident to all of us, our Mexican youth with a simplicity to be found only among the gamins of our large cities, said: “Well, you have earthquakes in California, and the hole must have been filled up.”

Sometime afterwards, I had the vein recorded, as it was gold bearing. The Mexican encampment at the Diltz mine, divided their force, some of them working for me in the placer claim, while others left for Saxton’s creek, where they found ounce diggings, and the quartz vein, afterwards known as the Snyder vein. A few only remained to prospect the Diltz mine, which was done by erecting an arasta and grinding out the “pocket” they had discovered. When they left, another party of Mexicans, headed by a monte dealer from Quartzburg, found the vein on the lower Saxton’s creek trail, a little north east of the Diltz mine. Champlin H. Spencer had a small party of Mexicans from Sonora, working for him, who first attracted his attention to the Spencer vein. Dr. John M. Creppelle, also had Mexicans working for him on Sherlock, who reported the quartz vein better than many worked in Mexico. Some of the doctor’s men became dissatisfied and left him. In order to keep the others employed until diggings could be found, I allowed the doctor the free use of a small piece on my claim, out of which his men took the largest piece of pure gold (as far as known) ever taken from the southern mines. It weighed 9 pounds avoirdupois, while that taken out by Paddy McCann and Pat Hussey weighed but six.

Sometime previous to the quartz era inaugurated by “Quartz Johnson,” Thomas J. Whitlock with a party of men from Missouri had been persistently mining near the head of Sherlock’s creek, but finding the lead run out, as they supposed, prospected the gulches tributary to what is now Whitlock’s creek. Whitlock’s men found rich diggings up the creek, and tracing “float” or ragged gold to the Whitlock vein, where convinced that it afforded the gold of their newly discovered placer. Taking the hint from this suggestion, outcroppings were traced over the ridge into the Fremont Estate, and at the foot of the hill along the trail to Mariposa, the same quality of gold was found, and in many instances after a heavy rain, gold was picked up from the surface. The Whitlock men finally made a record of their discovery, at which date your county records will show, but finding the cost of machinery too great for prudent investment of their hard earned gold they sold out their mine to me, and left for Missouri. About that time there was a quartz furore encouraged by the remarkable assay furnished us by the foreign and native Professors of San Francisco. Some of these assays proved that we had mines that would in some instances, yield us thousands of dollars per ton. One instance I remember where a metallurgist afterwards connected with the U.S. Mint at San Francisco, reported to me a yield of 12-1/2 cents per pound, for rock I never found a color in, nor could my expert Mexican miners discover any. A probable solution of the mystery was, that by some error, another specimen had been substituted for the one sent by myself.

What wonder that for a time in those early days, we had golden dreams, and went our bottom dollar on the prospect? Dr. Brunson, the first surgeon of the Mariposa battalion, brought over two or three of his negro slaves and first prospected the Spencer vein, but the encouragement received, held him but a short time, when he took his negroes and went back to his southern home. Captain Hawley was the first considerable worker in the quartz mining, and the first victim. His mill was put up at enormous expense to crush rock from Saxton’s Creek mines, and afterwards, to work the Spencer vein. Another mill was put up by an ingenious mechanic, whose name I do not now recall, near the mouth of Saxton’s creek. Captain Hawley failed to extract gold in paying quantities, and his mill of eight or nine stamps, was sold to the French company in which Spencer and myself unfortunately became interested. The superintendent of the company had been a Parisian sub editor, well versed in all that belonged to the opera-bouffe, or the comedie Francais, but gold quartz mining he knew absolutely nothing.

Therefore, a Berlin Mining Engineer was employed at a salary of five hundred dollars per month, and a mechanical engineer and mill wright was also employed at a like salary and board, while the superintendent, bookkeeper, his body-servant and cook, probably required another thousand dollars a month for their services.

The mill wright referred to in your article, was entirely secondary to the quartz crushing mill, and was a very ingenious contrivance of the French mechanician, which, though it cost a good deal, could never be made to work. As for the Spencer and Whitlock veins, though barely prospected by the company, they reported a large expenditure in building roads and in opening the mines for future economic exploration. I will dwell upon this part of the history of those mines further than to say, that the French company fulfilled none of the engagements. Spencer went to Paris and brought suite in the criminal court against the president of the company. It was proved that he was quality of criminal mismanagement, and was rigorously punished after the summary methods of French law. He said in substance, that the only way to make money out of mining, was "to work the shares up and down." Spencer advised me of the situation, and when he wrote me, supposed he had reorganized the company upon an honest and solid basis. I was assured of being refunded any expense I might incur in keeping the mill and property intact for the share holders, and when attempt was made by the superintendent to place the property under a lease for a term of years, I levied a execution, and obtained a personal judgement for non fulfillment of contract. The mill property was sold on execution, and I bought it in. With a view of keeping up the work upon lodes or veins, I associated with me, in running the mill and working the mines, Charles Chapin, an engineer who had some experience at the Mt. Gaines mill. The expense of refitting the mill was greater than our combined capital would justify, and when we finally got to work, our expenses overran our receipts of gold. This was principally owing to the great cost of labor at that time, and the little preparation that had been made to extract the ore economically.

I was encouraged to hope for succor, by receiving a letter from a special agent of the company, who had then just arrived in San Francisco. The agent wrote me to learn the situation, I replied by advising a continuance of his journey to the mines. The next steamer brought news of the disorganization of the company, and an entire abandonment of their California exploitation's in mines. I had pledged the mill property for money to pay sheriff's fees, and a personal fund of \$1,500 in San Francisco, I drew and paid what I esteemed debts of honor. As to the mill and mines, they were transferred, as if by earthquake, into other hands.

It has been said that the passion for gambling is incurable. I believe that, for mining is equally so. At all events, with the English maxim before me, that "it takes a mine to work a mine," had I the means to indulge in the excitement of the almost certain reward, I would organize a company to work all the mines on Whitlock's, Sherlock's and Saxton creeks, by erecting a water power mill, located at some suitable point on the Merced river, which might be occasionally supplied with ore by a narrow gauge railroad. Then the other difficulties which beset our pioneer attempts at mining would vanish before the improved methods of saving gold, diamond drills, compressed air and dynamite.

I have some speculation on who this Thomas Jefferson Whitlock was but at the moment it is pure speculation and has yet to be confirmed by any of the descendants of this part of the family.

In the 1850 census for Mariposa Co., California there is a Thos. J. Whitlock age 41 born in North Carolina. I would say it is fairly certain this is the Thomas Jefferson Whitlock who was mining for gold in Mariposa in 1849. It is clear from the documents sent in by Matt Evans that Thomas was from Missouri as he mentions this several times and indicates that he returned to Missouri after selling the mine about 1852.

The only Thomas Jefferson Whitlock born in 1809 in North Carolina and living in Missouri is Thomas the son of Thomas Whitlock and Mary Ponsonbay. He was born in Surry Co., North Carolina November 20, 1809 and is living in Green Co., Missouri by 1832. The only anomaly is that he also shows in the 1850 census for Robinson, Green Co., Missouri. For this reason he had been discounted up until I received the additional details from Matt. There are just too many indications that fit for this Thomas not to be the most likely candidate.

This family is part of the WHITLOCK25 chart and I would be interested to hear from descendants of Thomas Jefferson Whitlock on this speculation.

HOGGATT/WHITLOCK FAMILIES

I recently received an interesting Rootsweb entry by Nancy Brister regarding Samuel Liniers Winston who married Ann Whitlock Hoggatt Nov.7,1816 Adams Co., Mississippi. The item refers to an application for a widow's pension for a War of 1812 vet. The amount of detail provided by the pension application is invaluable to a genealogist.

Mississippi Militia, Winston, Samuel L., Ann W. Winston, Widow's Orig. 15,302, Widow's Cert. 24,578
Widow's Brief:

Ann W. Winston, Natchez, Adams County, Mississippi; Filed: 11 April 1878. Atty: Gilbert Mayers, Memphis, Tenn. Alleged Service: Cornet, Capt. James Wilkins' Miss. Militia. Enlisted at Old Fort Dearbon, 1813, in Capt. James Kemp's Co., of Capt. John Doherty's, or Capt. James Farrar's Co., Hinds' County Regt. in Battle of New Orleans.

Widow's Declaration: Miss., Adams County __ day of __ 1875 appeared before Allison H. Foster, Chancery Clk. Mrs. Ann Whitlock Winston, aged seventy-five yrs., resident of said county, wid of Samuel Lanier Winston, married 7 Nov 1816 by Judge Samuel Brooks in Adams County. Her husband died at "Traveler's Rest Plantation" in Adams Co., 31 Dec 1831. Wit. T. Hewett, Samuel W. Stanton

Shelby Moore deposes before the Chancery Clk, Adams County:

"I have lived in Adams County ever since I was a child in arms for near 73 years; was the slave of James Hoggatt, the father of Mrs. Ann W. Winston, first; and, afterward, the slave of Gen. Samuel L. Winston and have remained with the family ever since and lived on the old Hoggatt plantation where Mrs. Ann W. Winston, my young mistress, was married to Gen. Winston. I was present at the wedding which took place in 1816 on the 7th of Nov. I was at the wedding as the servant of my young mistress. Mr. Philip Hoggatt was the groomsman. I am about 74 years of age. Samuel L. Winston, the husband of Mrs. Ann W. Winston, died many long years ago, near fifty years now. I forget the year."

Theophilus Paxton deposed in Adams County, and said:

"I have resided in Adams County for upwards of sixty-five years and was the slave of Phillip Hoggatt and lived on the plantation adjoining Mrs. Ann T. Winston's place. Phillip Hoggatt, my owner, died in the year 1855. I was at her wedding as servant of my master, Philip Hoggatt, who was groomsman. I am about 76 years of age."

Statement signed by J. F. H. Claiborne:

I knew the late Gen. Samuel L. Winston from my boyhood and was favored with his friendship as I grew up. Have often conversed with him about his tour of military service. He informed me that he was a member of the Adams Troops of Benjamin Farrar, Captain, commanded by Maj. F. L. Claiborne; called into the service of the U.S. in 1807 by the Governor of the Mississippi Territory; marched to repel the Spaniards who had crossed the Sabine into Louisiana; (much detail as to Samuel L. Winston's service, including War of 1812).

Jacob Stuart appeared and answered interrogations about Samuel L. Winston's military service. Knew him intimately from infancy until 1830 when Mr. Winston died. He lived with him all of the time. Mr. Winston was occupied part of the time in planting and served in the Land Office other times; was serving there prior to the War of 1812. Wit: Louis Winston.

Aaron Stanton, deposed in Adams County 30 January 1886. Planter, 45 years old, lived at Stanton, Adams County; knew Ann W. Winston, who was his maternal grandmother. She died 22 December 1882 at "Clover Hill Plantation" about 10 miles east of Natchez. He reached the house some hours after she died, but was present at funeral. She was buried at "Traveler's Rest Plantation" in the family graveyard, adjoining "Clover Hill." She died either 21 or 22 of December and was buried on the 23rd. William E. Dent, Special Examiner.

Letter from Hon. W. M. Spring, House of Representatives, to Commissioner of Pensions, dated Washington, November 30, 1878, re Mrs. Winston's pension claim, states: "Her husband was not only a soldier of the War of 1812, but her father was an officer in the Revolutionary War, to whom I am informed, Congress voted a sword for services in that War."

There is also Agnes Whitlock Hoggatt who married Valentine Sublet Allen (Jan.1,1764-Sep.6,1840). Agnes was the daughter of Nathaniel Hoggatt who married Rachel Tate. The above pension application states that Ann Whitlock Hoggatt was the daughter of James Hoggatt. The only Hoggatt/Whitlock connection I have been able to uncover so far is Frances (Jones?) Whitlock the widow of James Whitlock of Hanover Co., Va (d.1736) married Anthony Hoggett of Albemarle Co., Va in 1738. I have written to several persons researching the Hoggatt family to determine if Nathaniel and James Hoggatt were sons of Anthony and they could have named their daughters after Frances.

HENRY JOSEPH WHITLOCK, PHOTOGRAPHER

The following information written by David Simkin of Brighton, UK was posted on the GenForum by Larry Perkins:

“Henry Joseph Whitlock was the son of Sarah (born c1815, died 24 October 1862, Birmingham) & Joseph Whitlock (born 20 February 1806, Olney, Bucks - died 1857, Birmingham - death registered in Solihull in December Quarter of 1857). Joseph Whitlock was one of the earliest photographic artists in Britain and the first to establish a permanent photographic studio in Birmingham. In 1842, Joseph Whitlock reportedly paid Richard Beard £1000 for a licence to take daguerreotype portraits in Warwickshire and Northamptonshire.

On Monday, 30 January 1843, Joseph Whitlock opened Birmingham's first daguerreotype studio at 120, New Street. At the same time, Whitlock opened a photographic portrait studio at the Royal Assembly Rooms in Leamington Spa. During 1843, Joseph Whitlock also opened studios in Coventry, Rugby, and Warwick. In January 1844, Whitlock opened a further studio at Northampton. In 1847, Joseph Whitlock had established a photographic studio at Bromley House, Angel Row, Nottingham. In 1849 and between 1851 and 1853 the studio worked under the partnership of Whitlock & Thompson. Only the studio in Birmingham proved successful. For the first seven years or so, Joseph Whitlock held a monopoly in making photographic portraits in Birmingham. In 1852, Joseph Whitlock expanded his business in Birmingham and recruited his two sons Henry Joseph (born c1835 Olney, Bucks) and Frederick (born c1839 Olney, Bucks.) to assist him.

In 1855, Henry Joseph Whitlock left Birmingham to set up his own studio at 42 High Street, Worcester. His father, Joseph Whitlock continued to run the photographic studio in New Street, Birmingham, but he was dogged by ill health. Joseph's wife and sons became more involved in the running of the business as his health declined

When Joseph Whitlock died at the end of 1857 at the age of 51, the Birmingham studio, now at 110 New Street, passed to his widow Mrs Sarah Whitlock. On 24th October, 1862, Mrs Whitlock died at 110 New Street, Birmingham at the age of 47.

After the death of his parents, Henry Joseph Whitlock established a studio of his own at 11 New Street Birmingham. Henry J Whitlock was assisted by his two sons Arthur (born 1865 Birmingham) [the 20 year old lad standing at the back of the family portrait dated 1885] and Henry junior, aka Harry (born c1871 Birmingham).

Henry Joseph Whitlock founded the firm of H. J. Whitlock & Sons of Birmingham and Wolverhampton. A studio named Whitlock Brothers was operating in Wolverhampton at 63 Darlington Street in the early 1900s. Apparently the firm of Whitlock continued as a photographic business in Birmingham until the mid-1960s.

Henry Joseph Whitlock's younger brother, Frederick Whitlock (born c1839 Olney, Bucks.) was also a photographer and established his own studio in New Street, Birmingham and later at Park Road, Sutton Coldfield. Frederick's two sons, Herbert (born c 1870 Birmingham) and Frederick junior (c1874 Birmingham) were both photographers. In 1901, Herbert Whitlock was working as a photographer alongside his father in Sutton Coldfield and his brother Frederick W. Whitlock was a photographer living in Oxford.”

Our records show that Joseph Whitlock (1806-1857) married Sarah Mason (1815?-1862). Joseph was the son of James & Sarah (Holloway) Whitlock who were married at Ravenstone, **BKM** October 7, 1799. James Whitlock was born about 1780 and died in Olney, **BKM** in 1853. He shows on the 1841 census as a Timber Merchant.

LEMUEL WHITLOCK

Union District- An inquisition indented taken at the house of Joesph Huges in district aforesaid on 2 Aug. 1842 before Isaac Gregory, Coroner, upon view of the body of William Bulter, a Stage driver in said district, then and there being dead, by the oaths of Joseph Hughes, Ferdinan Cain, William Davis, Nimrod Sharp, D.M. Mott (name also given as Mack Motes), John Giles, Senator, Hancock Porter, LEMUEL WHITLOCK, William Faucett, S.W. Bently, Lewis Hancock and Richard Nance, being a lawful jury of inquest, do say that from such evidence as has been heard on the occasion we do believe that said William Bulter came to his death by a fall from his seat on the hack which he was driving near the dwelling house of John Hughes, and came to his death by misfortune or accident. Signed and sealed by Isaac Gregory, Coronor, Joesph Hughs, Foreman, Furdinan (X) Cain, William (X) Davis, Nimrod (X) Sharp, D.Mc. Motte, J. Giles, Hancock Porter, LEMUEL WHITLOCK, William (X) Faucett, S.W. Bently, Lewis Hancock and Richard (X) Nance.”

Jonathan Whitlock was born in the 1760's the son of William & Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock of Union Co., South Carolina. The names in the above document are very familiar, many with possible connections to Jonathan Whitlock and the WHITLOCK33 chart:

Ferdinand Cain - possible relation of Jemima Cain who married Jonathan Whitlock

William Faucett - Jonathan Whitlock's sister Nancy married a Richard Faucett

S. W. Bentley - Jonathan's sister Mary married William Bentley - S.W. Bentley is William's son Samuel W. Bentley

Even the Nance family has Whitlock connections.

Sometimes you think you the answer must be right in front of you and you still can't see it. There are just too many familiar names in this document for there not to be some connection between these people.
