It has been an interesting summer and hopefully that will be reflected in this issue of the Newsletter. I have carried on the theme of the Virginia families with the second and last extract from the Catherine I. (Turner) Moseley diary and have given additional emphasis to the South Carolina families in this issue.

While in Georgia and South Carolina this summer we were very fortunate to be able to spend some time in Griffin, Georgia getting to know Eddie and Beth Whitlock better. Patrick and Eddie are eBay aficionados and email back and forth fairly often. Eddie and Beth were great hosts in true southern style and I only hope we are able to return the hospitality in the not too distant future. We had a wonderful time and as Eddie and Beth live in the middle of area Patrick's family came from in Georgia, we were able to meld Lynch and Whitlock research in very interesting ways. It did not hurt that Patrick's distant cousin, John Lynch runs the Holliday, Dorsey, Fife museum in Fayetteville, Georgia. He was a wealth of knowledge about the area and both the Lynch and Whitlock families. The house the museum was in has connections to both "Doc" Holliday of Tombstone fame and Margaret Mitchell and "Gone with the Wind" and just going through the museum with John was an interesting experience on its own. The clincher was learning that John Lynch was also a Whitlock descendant through Ornan Bradley Whatley who married Elizabeth Willingham Whitlock in Green Co., Georgia in 1804. Elizabeth is part of the WHITLOCK33 as is Eddie Whitlock.

I have done an article concentrating on the South Carolina Deeds I extracted while we were there but I also wanted to let researchers know that there has been a major correction to the WHITLOCK38 chart, the descendants of Bennett Whitlock of Union Co., South Carolina. I have done a separate article on the two William Henry Whitlocks who were born in Union Co., SC in 1843 and 1844 which hopefully explains what has transpired.

If any of the Langtree, Devon family are planning a trip back to Devon, Pat Root recommends the Old Rectory B & B in Langtree as a great place to stay while you are there. Needless to say it is across the street from the church and handy to everything in Langtree. Pat says the Old Rectory B & B is a marvelous old house with high ceilings and a lovely curving staircase. "Sue and Terry who own it, are most helpful". If you search "Old Rectory" on the internet you will find their website. I remember spending many hours in the Rectory dining room transcribing the Whitlock entries from the original Langtree parish registers that were kept there in an old truck in the 1970's. Thanks also to Pat for the photographs of some of the stones in the Langtree churchyard.

I have mentioned the South Carolina Deeds (R2533) but there are other items of note in the additions lists for this issue. Joan Whitlock continues to provide new information on the Whitlocks of Wales. The 1861 to 1901 census copies (R2528) she sent, filled in quite a few blanks and enable us to place many of the certificates she also sent (CERT997-1003 & CERT1010-1015). This research has finally given us a comprehensive picture of the Devon Whitlocks who went to Wales in the early 1800's and has confirmed and made it clear how each of them connect to the Langtree family.

Lawrence Otis continues his research in the Archives of Ontario with the latest collection of certificates (CERT1004-1009). He also has been into several internet sites that list vital stats and extracted the Whitlock and Whitlock entries.

Ann Sims has kindly sent us a pre-publication copy of her book *John Whitlock & Sarah Giddings Whitlock - South Carolina and Beyond* (R2537). This continues our South Carolina theme and is a great addition to our files. The book is laid out in a simple format, is full of photographs and will be treasured by all who are connected to the WHITLOCK86 family. Ann's book is 387 pages including the index.

Greg Whitlock sent me a email (X5918) about Rob Whitlock, jazz pianist in Los Angeles and his dad Bob Whitlock, a famous guitar player. Patrick also saw this on the internet and bought Rob's *Sketchin' 2 CD* for me for my birthday. If you wish more information check out www.robwhitlock.com or www.sketchinrecords.com. I assume the Bob Whitlock playing on some of my Stan Getz CD's is Rob's father. Greg also forwarded a great collection of obituaries (X5919-X5934). Always useful to add this kind of detail to our files as obits often connect the generations together and confirm relationships.

I was very interested to receive an email through our website from Gayle Suggs (X5958) regarding a portrait of Mary Whitlocke (1711-1802). I was hoping to obtain a photograph of the portrait for our files but I have not had a reply to my email. Mary was the great grand-daughter of Sir Bulstrode Whitlocke (1605-1675) and shows on the WHITLOCK02H chart as the daughter of Samuel Whitlock of Chilton Foliat, Wiltshire. She married George Gerrard at Hungerford, Wiltshire July 2,1757. Hopefully we will learn more about this portrait.

I have received several messages regarding the Easterbrook family. This family can be traced back to John Easterbrook (1716-1787) of Holne, Devon and connects to the Whitlock family through the marriage of Hilton Whitlock Smale and Annie Aldwildie Peart in Toronto, Ontario June 10,1903. The mothers of both Hilton and Annie were Easterbrook sisters and Hilton's father John Whitlock Smale was the son of Jonas Smale and Sally Whitlock of Petrockstow, Devon. These emails have filled in a good amount of detail on how these families are connected to the WHITLOCK01 chart.

I don't mention him a lot, but Chuck Rockett continues his yeoman efforts scanning the internet for Whitlocks and you can see from all the additions lists there is steady stream of information due to his behind the scenes efforts on our behalf. While on the subject of Chuck. I had to spend the month of June listening to a trial and took the time to blitz my way through the 1900 US census entries that Chuck Rockett had extracted for us some years ago. I managed to get 371 pages entered into the computer (of 479). My goal is to get all this information entered into the computer and made available to researchers. When Dick Whitlock gets a chance to update the website files, the finished states will be available. I already refer to both the 1880 and 1900 census' regularly and find it a great boon to have both in the computer.

Great additions all and my thanks to all who sent in their latest finds.

I have been asked to record on the mailing labels when subscriptions are paid to. This year my annual summer conference was in Niagara Falls and from there we flew to Atlanta with plans to spend time in the area doing research into Patrick's Lynch ancestors. On the itinerary was Charleston, South Carolina and we spent a very interesting morning at the South Carolina Historical Society in Charleston. Patrick worked on the family of Thomas Lynch who signed the Declaration of Independence and I concentrated on the their collection of records from Union Co. This included the great series of books by Brent Holcomb on Union County records including the ones on Wills and Deeds. The one on Wills had been extracted and was in our files but the one on Deeds was new to me.

Since returning home I have extracted all the Deeds relating to Whitlocks and arranged them chronologically to form the beginning of a SCLAND file. Based on the VALAND file format that Louise Birchfield put together for all Virginia records pre 1800, this file will record every Whitlock reference to South Carolina we have in our files pre 1830, arranged chronologically by county.

This list of Deeds immediately yielded results. In 1812 and 1821 the following related Deeds are registered:

I have made some assumptions based on these Deeds. Molly Whitlock we know was Mary Rowntree the wife of William Whitlock. They were married at St.James Northam, Goochland Co., Virginia December 22,1767. Sally Whitlock was Sarah Whitlock daughter of William and Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock. Sarah married Thomas Ray at Padgett Creek, Union Co., South Carolina in March 1804. John Whitlock is likely William and Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock's son Jonathan Whitlock who married Jemima Cain. The land in question is on Brown's Creek. I think it is reasonable to assume that all the land transactions on Browns Creek likely have some family connection. The 1821 Deed gives additional dates when some of these transactions took place. This explains why Sally is shown as Whitlock and not Ray as she transferred the land in 1800 and did not married Thomas Ray until 1804.

In 1815 there is another reference to Brown's Creek in the following Deed:

Is it possible that Lot Whitlock is a grandson of William & Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock and a son of Jonathan & Jemima (Cain) Whitlock? There is nothing to indicate this, but Lot is buying land on Brown's Creek in the same area the John Whitlock inherited land from William. The name Perhasky Whitlock shows in this Deed and is the first time I have seen this name.

In 1816 there are further references to Brown's Creek in the following Deeds:

In this case it is Robert Whitlock is mentioned. Assume this is Robert Whitlock who moved to Roane Co., Tennessee. His father, Robert Whitlock Sr. was a brother to William Whitlock and is noted in an 1811 Brown's Creek Deed to Christopher Brandon as "Robert Whitlock Senr decd". Robert Whitlock Jr married Martha Nance. Note the Thomas Nance in this Deed who sells this same land a few months later. Note also Robert Whitlock Jr is a witness and Richard Faucett, whose mother, Nancy Whitlock, was a daughter of William & Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock, is also a witness on the latter Deed. William Bently is the second husband of Mary Whitlock the daughter of William & Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock.

The name Christopher Brandon appears in connection with the Whitlock family on quite a few records and I have not yet figured out if he is connected to the Whitlocks as well.

The clue to all this research still has to be the family of Jonathan Whitlock and Jemima Cain who were married in the 1780's and lived in the Brown's Creek area of Union Co. We know they had at least 8 children, William, Rhody, Melton, Willison, Edward, Alexander, Obediah W. and Jane. The only child we have been able to trace is Obediah who we find in the 1870 census of Arkansas. Records of Brawly, Scott Co., Arkansas show he was born October 18, 1803 in Union Co., SC and died in Scott Co., Arkansas Sep.18,1875. His wife was Mary Jane ?? (1823-1892) and they had at least one son John H. Whitlock born about 1862. None of the other children of John and Jemima have been traced.

There is certainly too much commonality between Lot Whitlock and Jonathan and Jemima (Cain) Whitlock for the two families not to be related in some way.

What I was hoping to find were Deeds showing land transferring between family members that could be used to prove some of the relationships. The only one that had this type of information was the one showing the children of William and Mary (Rowntree) Whitlock which we already knew. What we are left with is supposition that if all these Whitlocks are buying and selling land in the same specific area of Union Co. that there is likely some connection between them.

I have the probate records for both Jonathan Whitlock and Jemima Cain. While these records list the names of at least eight of the their children, as I have shown above, none of the names match the charts we are trying to connect. Hopefully useful information, but no breakthrough yet.

TWO WILLIAM HENRY WHITLOCKs OF UNION CO., SC b.1843/4

Some weeks ago I received information from Charles Whitlock of Akron, Ohio that indicated that his ancestor was William Henry Whitlock born December 9, 1844 in Union Co., South Carolina. As we already had another family shown as the one born December 9, 1844 I went back to the original records to see if I could figure this out.

It quickly became evident we had been showing the wrong William Henry Whitlock as Harvey Duncan Whitlock's son on the WHITLOCK38 chart. The original records showed that there had been a question over the December 9, 1844 birthdate as the gravestone says August 14, 1843. The clincher was that Charles Whitlock's family had gone to Texas and in the family Bible records someone has written "Texas" next to William Henry Whitlock's birth record for December 9, 1844. The question then was how did the other William Henry Whitlock fit in? As both William Henry Whitlocks were children in the 1850's it was logical that they both should show on one or both of the 1850 & 1860 census' and they do. William Henry Whitlock born December 9, 1844 shows with his parents Harvey Duncan Whitlock and Sarah A. Kitchens in Union Co., SC age 5 in 1850 and age 15 in 1860. The other William Henry Whitlock born August 14, 1843 is shown living with William Whitlock on the 1860 census age 17. I only have the index entry for William Whitlock for the 1850 census so not sure if he shows there.

The question then is who is this William Whitlock that Lot Whitlock is living with? In 1860 he is age 70 and it is not clear if the children shown on the census are his children or grandchildren. The only William that fits this age range is the one married to Delia Fowler. It is not possible to tell if William was married more than once but there is no wife shown on the 1860 census with William. The next step therefore was to determine what other records there might be relating to this part of the family. I contacted Philip McAlister who had originally sent in the information on William Henry Whitlock b. Aug. 14, 1843. Philip confirmed that he also does not think William Henry Whitlock born Aug. 14, 1843 is the son of Harvey Duncan Whitlock. Philip has some records relating to William Henry Whitlock's service in the SC 6th Cavalry of the Confederate forces but nothing to confirm the name William Henry's father and even more important the name of his mother.

For the time being I have shown William Henry Whitlock's family at the end of the WHITLOCK38 chart. The family of William and Delia (Fowler) Whitlock is shown at the end of the WHITLOCK33 chart. Hopefully further information will be received that will enable us to determine these relationships as well.

As an aside to this story, while this tells us about the "Texas" written next to Henry William's birthdate in the family Bible records it makes me look again at the "Tenn" written next to James Preston Whitlock's birth in 1850 and particularly the "Peru" written next to Dunnovant Gladden Whitlock's birth in 1848!! There has to be a story there.

CATHERINE I. (TURNER) MOSELEY'S DIARY (PART 2)

Wednesday. April 19th (Cont)

At breakfast I was told that Abraham Lincoln's burial would come off and the day was to be observed as Sunday. Cannon were fired and the churches were open, services held.

In the midst of it, a Federal officer, Col. Barker offered us the poor accommodations afforded by Army Wagons.-- We accepted them and all was hurry and confusion, "Going Home": such leave taking, promises to write etc. About 5 o'clock, we started, walked two or three hundred yards, we separated, two or three getting in one wagon and four or five in another.

The brave, the noble Lee's cannon served us for seats. We traveled on, four or five miles of beautiful country. Beautiful in its ruins. The little Village of Farmsville looked more lovely than the description I had had of it, and it was with sad and melancholy feeling that I looked back upon it as we slowly wound our way over hills, the memory of which will come back often, bringing with the, many a deep sigh.

At nightfall we halted for the night and most providentially, found shelter in the house of a once wealthy gentleman, Major Watson. He gave us the best accommodations he had, his parlor. Said his house had been filled since the battle, with the wounded of both Armies, Confederates and Federals.

It is now 10 o'clock and I am sitting in a rocking chair, while the floor and sofas are filled with sleepy girls. Our protector, Leuit. Brown is seemingly very polite.

Thursday. April 20, 1865

I'm passing over the worst road in the ".S.", or the C. S. What I am now suffering has been endured my many. The country is very picturesque, and under any other circumstances, I should enjoy the scenery.

Rice's Station, our driver informed us, was the last place General Lee made a stand, or at least a decided resistance to the enemy.

I was seated on one of the Cannon which belonged to him, and was perhaps used that day and handled more than probably by my brave cousins. Imagine my feelings of imagination if, indeed it may be said that I felt anything but the intolerable jolts and aching body.

One o'clock, we arrived at the Junction, nothing but Yankees every way I looked, and there we had to sit for the longest time. But our Wagoner was polite and kind, and at length our fears were relieved, as well as our eyes by the sight of a little Cadet, Confederate named Taylor of Richmond, who came and helped us out and carried us to the rest of our party--and then Lieut. Brown, looking like he never was so scared before, marched us off, we knew not whither, but asked no questions. The question presented to our minds was soon answered by our guide, halting us in front of a neat little building, deserted by its former inhabitants, and breaking the lock, he swept the floor, had the bedsteads brought for seats. Soon after, several officers entered and brought us refreshments, cream and peaches and hardtack.

We were much more pleasantly and kindly cared for than we had expected, and this, I considered providential.

For supper, Lieut. Brown gave us the nicest crackers and cheese, then finding that we could not be accommodated except with one box car, and as the weather seemed unsettled, a party of officers advised us to wait until this morning, the 27th, Friday.

I spent a somewhat comfortable night, they kindly provided us with plenty of nice, White blankets and candles and gave us one of the sweetest serenades. They sang "Rock me to sleep, Mother", and "Mother Will Comfort Us When She Is Near", "Goodbye at the Door", and other songs.

Now, someone has kindly offered us breakfast. I read some sweet, comforting Psalms both yesterday and this morning.

On the way to Peters. Arrived in Petersburg at one o' clock and heard to our great delight that the boat, at three, leaving City Point could be reached in time to take us on to Richmond. We went on a little better than one mile, the engine broke and here we are waiting for another, the noisy roar of the steam sounds like the vent of passion in the ragins of an ungoverned temper.

The scene is rendered more pleasant and my situation much more agreeable by change in my neighbors. Just now every man I saw was a Yankee, now there are three gentle looking Confederates seated around me.

We had a nice breakfast given us by our Conquerors, conserved peaches, loaf bread, and tea.

Went down to the cars, a special coach had been provided, and we were ushered into a car which was filled with Yankee Officers, with the exception of those seats reserved for us, 23 in number. Two of the girls got off at Nottaway C., two further on, Eugenia Foulks, Alice Crenshaw, and Blacks and Whites.

I reached City Point about an hour before sunset, and after standing half an hour in a small, crowded room, we were politely informed by a Yankee Captain that in case we did not get on board the steamboat, he had engaged rooms for us at the hotel. But a Col. Bates, a cousin of one of the young ladies, and in the Federal Army, and under whose care we were placed by Lieut. Brown, engaged a boat and carried us to it.

When I first saw City Point, my attention was called to the mast and sails on the river (twas the first time I had ever seen such a sight) I sat by a nice Confederate Cadet, who lived in Norfolk, had not been home from his mother, she told him to fight them to the last. I heard his name was Wesley.

I enjoyed the scenery amazingly, wished for my ma and sister to enjoy it with me. The parlor in the boat is very nice and appears elegant in contrast with the accommodations we have received in the last few days.

Would you know where I'm sitting while writing, I'm in the parlor above mentioned, surrounded by my noisy party. And in addition a Yankee Major, a lday Yank and several Confederates, all talking. Then make allowances for this.

"Delays make trouble and procrastination is the thief of time." I did not write any here Saturday, although the scenes through which I passed might furnish material for a waverly novel. And tonight, Sun. 24th, I'm tired and sleepy, and that. more than usual because I've lost more sleep in the last 6 nights than I can give up.

Monday. April 25. 1865

Have just returned from a long and tiresome walk, went down to Greaner's and then to Tolbert's in search of the Miss Thomas, that we might go together and get our passes home but could not find them, and hoping to meet with them at some of the offices, I hastened on.

Went first to Gen. Patrick and thence to Captain Schofield, who directed me to go to Lieut. Townsend. I went to his office situated in the Capitol, found him very gentlemanly and polite. Memory reverts to the pleasant time I spent within those same old chambers but a few months ago. How have a few weeks changed the scene.

I must not neglect to give a sketch of Sat. I rose much refreshed

Sat. morning and went out in the deck of the Vessel which was the Thomas Colyier. The breeze was very refreshing after our crowded state room. Binnie Harrison, Ella Tolbert, Ipora Lee, and Florence Temple were my companions. The scenery was more beautiful than any I had ever seen.

Breakfast was soon ready and very bountiful. One dish, I had never seen, Irish potatoes, sliced and fried.

A little after seven, we got on another steamer and went up to the wharf and landing, were requested to see after our baggage, mine was not to be found, all the rest was safe. I thought and said when I saw the blue jacket carrying it off, that I never expected to see it again! Here, the major took leave of us and the three Baltimore girls, Bettie Yerby, Anna Ball, and Georgia McCarty.

Soon we were going up the James River at the rate of 5 miles an hour. I had never imagined traveling by water as pleasant. I watched the crested waves and my mind compared my journey to the voyage of life. I was the Howlet House, the splendor of which I had known as also something of the short life and many trials of some of its inmates. Its crumbling walls called to mind the words of Solomon, "Vanity of Vanities, all is Vanity."

The batteries of Chefins Bluff, Beast Butler's observatories, Drwry's Bluff, all spoke to me many sad lessons. The awful looking gunboats and monitors that frowned upon me, and the charred and broken ruins of lovely houses, and as I neared Richmond, the wretch of our own little Navy reminded me of the uncertainty of all things earthly.

Arrived at Rockets about 12, the Richmond girls left me-Ella T., Minnie H., Isora and Marlisa Lee and Judith Haskins, all bidding me an affectionable goodbye, the others passing on unmindful of me.

Here, I took a seat in the omnibus, thinking that I could pay some of Willie's silver, but they charged me 50 cents, and when I said I couldn't pay, a Confederate Col. told me he would.

There was a Miss Chesney and Miss Lee, whom I met at City Point, and their grief on reaching home and finding it so changed, affected me greatly.

At the Spotswood we parted from my unknown friend, who gave the Negro in charge of our baggage, a dollar, bidding him carry me where I wanted to go, and into his wagon, I climbed, together with the two ladies.

Soon I was his only passenger and after driving up some of the principal streets, he put my Hover sack and me down at Aunt E's door, tired, happy and travel stained.

I opened the door and there sat Sallie Turner, Aunt E, and Dick and one of Uncle's servants. They looked at me like they thought I was a ghost. Sallie had been here since before the evacuation of the city.

Tuesday

Went again to the passport office in the Capitol. Lieut. Townsend, the officer in charge, recognized me as having been there the day previous, and offered me a pass whenever I wanted it.

My breast pin mended at Phillips, B-Street, 25¢. Sallie and I then paid Mr. Holdimer a short visit.

Wednesday 26

Aunt E. was sick this morning and for the first time for months, I went into the kitchen to help. This evening Sal and I went to Mrs. Sneads and again to Mrs. Pishur's, where I met last evening, several poor ladies, one a widow and a Christian, who had lost their all by the blowing up of the magazine. Thousands are in the same awful situation. My Calico, Daphney washed it and I hope I have it in my power to appear decent.

Thursday. April 27

Sallie and I spent the day at Uncle Dick's, a pleasant time, all well.

Friday. April 28

Sallie and I went early to the packet office, a.nd thence to Lieut. Townsend, got a pass and mailed my first letter for four years, with a U.S. postage stamp. I wrote to Pa.
