

# WHITLOCK FAMILY NEWSLETTER

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Another very hectic quarter that I was having trouble keeping up with everything happening. It started with the exciting find by Harold Lee Whitlock of the long missing baptismal record of the immigrant ancestor of the Virginia families. James Whitlock was baptized March 12, 1651 at Brightwell Baldwin, Oxfordshire "the sonn of Richard Whitlock and Joan his wife". This record was not made public until 2016 which explains why it took over forty years for it to come to light.

This is an excellent example of why researchers should check from time to time for long missing details that may now be available as more and more records are being digitized and put online. Our thanks to Harry for this. This item is CERT4721.

Included in this issue is an article on London Churches that evolved from Harry's itinerary of his recent trip to London and visits to the churches that would have been familiar to his seventeenth century London ancestors. I took this concept and added other London churches that also have an association with the WHITLOCK02H family. I think the main lesson from Harry's experience is plan ahead and make sure you know when the churches will be open. While the records of these churches exist not all the buildings survived the Great Fire of 1666 or the Blitz of WWII.

More information is being uncovered regarding Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) the father of the Virginia immigrant James Whitlock (1651-1716). Harry recently sent in four scholarly articles about him (R4349-R4352) and I have included all the latest detail we know in an article for this issue. He lived in interesting times!!

I have also included an article in this issue on Sir Bulstrode Whitlocke's youngest child Stephen. I will do one on his wife Hester Leche for the December issue. While all of Bulstrode's seventeen children survived to adulthood Stephen is one who died fairly young and not much is known about him.

The article by Kayla Langton about Marthaville, Louisiana in this issue also has a connection to same family as Martha Ann Whitlock (1821-1898) who Marthaville was named for was also a descendant of James Whitlock (1651-1716) of Virginia.

In other news, I have been having an interesting email conversation with Aloys Rigaut who I think lives in Belgium. He is researching the Rigaut family in Europe and was in contact with me regarding Otilia Rigaut (b.1840s?) who married Gustave Witlok of St. Petersburg in Russia. Aloys sent me details regarding a badge belonging to Gustave's son Vladimir Gustavovich Witlok in 1904 indicating he held fire or life insurance by a Moscow firm. He has been able to trace the family using telephone directories until 1925.

The name Gustave is not common and appears in our records several times but it is not clear if they are all related. Gustaf Roderick Whitlock born 1876 in Stockholm, Sweden is too young to be the one who married Otilia.

Gustaf Emanuel Whitlock (1809-1870) born in Stockholm, Sweden married Sopia Augusta Forsgren in 1847, three daughters Ellen 1848, Fanny 1850 & Anna 1852 no sons known.

It will be interesting to see if we can determine whether Otilia's husband descends from the Swedish line of the Gustave Whitlocke b.1776 the son of Charles Gustave Wittlocke (1754-1780). It is noted that Gustave Whitlocke "left Sweden and was never again heard of". This Gustave Whitlocke was a descendant of Richard Whitlock (1565-1624) who left London in 1580 to work for his uncle Christopher Colte in Danzig, Prussia. Richard Whitlock was a brother of Sir James Whitlock (1570-1632) and is the Richard Whitlock granted the right to use the Whitlock Coat of Arms in 1592. We have traced descendants of this part of the family to the early 1800's in Sweden but have not yet found any living descendants. Hopefully if we can trace a living male Whitlock descendant the YDNA testing could be useful to determine descendants of the Dutch Whitlocks and the English ones.

The Whitlock DNA project has been growing steadily with 307 members including 63 who have done the YDNA test. So far we have matched 775 researchers who have a Whitlock ancestor. Family Tree DNA set up an access category for Project members that did not allow access to matches which is the primary reason for members joining the Whitlock DNA project. Many project co-ordinators brought this to their attention and they have revised and renamed this category to "minimum". In the meantime I still have nineteen members with the new "minimum" access level that prevents them from participating in the matching process that enables me to determine their connections to matches with a Whitlock ancestor. This also prevents those with a Whitlock ancestors receiving the updated charts I send out showing their Whitlock cousins. Only members with the new "Limited" or "Advanced" access setting are able to fully participate in this programme.

I am currently about three-quarters of the way through the 307 current files doing my annual update of matches. This requires me to open each file and update my master spreadsheet with any new matches since my last update. I then contact any new matches and forward them an updated chart for their part of the Whitlock family. This has resulted in a huge amount of new research being added to our collection. While some members do not match with any other researchers with a Whitlock ancestor and some match with fifteen or more, on average every member has about eight others with a Whitlock ancestor they match with.

I am giving a talk on the Whitlock DNA project at a conference in October to show how One Name Research and Autosomal DNA testing can work together. I will demonstrate the matching process as well as show the different limitations of Autosomal DNA and YDNA tests.

I was pleased to receive from Bill Whitlock the details on Paul Morgan Whitlock who shows on the Arizona Memorial in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii as P.M. Whitlock. I had seen this information years ago but the detail Bill sent enabled me to confirm Paul was the son of William W. Whitlock and his wife Jessie M. Edwards (M1898) of Osage, Texas, part of the WHITLOCK41 family. Paul was the youngest of their nine children.

Glenn Whitlock continues to uncover new details mainly relating to the family of Robert Whitlock & Martha Nance (M1810's) of Roane Co., Tennessee WHITLOCK68. Glenn also found some Revolutionary War Pension payment records that enabled us to confirm dates of death for these Whitlocks and further clarify details on the several Thomas Whitlocks who served. (R4362) The New Mexico prison record for Dink C. Whitlock for bigamy enabled me to place him on the WHITLOCK33 family and Find a Grave records showed he died in Fresno, California in 1957. (R4357)

We were one of areas of the country covered in smoke from wildfires this summer so am pleased to see us move into Fall with cooler temperatures, clearer air and a the beginnings of more rain. I run a local backyard fruit gleaning programme for local charities here and we are swamped with amazing fruit this year so all that hot weather has had some benefits. My family research has had to take somewhat of a rest while I work through this process. Thanks also to everyone who knew I was having a pacemaker implanted in July and wished me well. It went smoothly and is doing its job. I have renewed energy and celebrated my 69<sup>th</sup> birthday on the 27<sup>th</sup> August.

My thanks to everyone who continues to support this research in so many ways. All much appreciated.

## RICHARD WHITLOCK (1616-1666)

In the December 2012 Whitlock Family Newsletter there was a short article about Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) confirming our discovery of proof that he was the father of James Whitlock (1651-1716) the original immigrant to Virginia in the 1670's. While his kinsman Thomas Whitlock (1615-1659) had come to Rappahannock, Virginia before him, the death of Thomas' only son Thomas Whitlock (1658?-1678) without issue made James Whitlock (1651-1716) the earliest immigrant with descendants still living today. Thomas Whitlock (1615-1659) and Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) were first cousins, Thomas' father Thomas and Richard's father Richard were brothers.

As more and more descendants of James Whitlock (1651-1716) are connected to the several charts that share same YDNA the interest in knowing more about James' father Richard has grown steadily and more research has been uncovered in the past six years. Most recently Harry Lee Whitlock found the baptism of James Whitlock March 12,1651 at Brightwell Baldwin in Oxfordshire. While we knew from Robert Whitlock's 1670 Will that his brother Richard had a son James who was alive in 1670 we had not been able to find any record of his birth. As Richard Whitlock and his wife Joane recorded the birth of their daughters Anna Whitlock bp.Feb.4,1647 at St. Margaret's, Westminster, London and Elizabeth Whitlock bp.Apr.18,1648 and br.Mar.26,1649 St. Dionis Backchurch, London, we had estimated their son James was born about 1650. We were fairly close as James was baptised in the last few days of 1651 which would be 1652 in the new calendar. This record was only made public in 2016 and we thank Harry for finding this and passing it on to us.

Harry also sent in four scholarly articles about Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) which provide additional detail about this most interesting and complicated ancestor. (R4349-R4352) The following article will repeat some the information in the 2012 article but I think it will be useful to give our most complete understanding of the life of Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) to date.

Richard Whitlock ( -1642) the father of Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) was one the last of the eleven known children of his parents John Whitlock (1515?-1589) and his wife Agnes Planner (1543?-1630). He must have been born very late in his father's life as he is shown as a boy in 1603 being enrolled at Merchant Taylor's School to be educated in the ways of business. He became a successful merchant of Broad Street Ward in London. His mother Agnes made a Will in 1629 as a woman in her eighties with many grandchildren. Richard and his wife are mentioned in his mother's Will.

On November 7 1615 at St. Andrews Holborn, London Richard Whitlock ( -1642) married Katherine Burchett the daughter of David Burchett of Wye in Kent. Their first child was Richard Whitlock bp.November 17,1616 at St. Peter le Poer, London. Richard was sent to Oxford and thrived in academia. Entering Magdalen College November 23,1632 at 16, and in two and half years on June 16,1635 he received a degree of Bachelor of Arts and in 1638 was elected a Fellow of All Souls College. By 1640 he had a Bachelor of Civil Law degree. The Oxfordshire Protestation Returns for February 24, 1642 show Richard was still at All Souls College, Oxford now age twenty five after nine years at Oxford, although he took no further degrees there.

In 1642 his father died and Richard became Lord of the Manor of Beches. Like his uncle William who sold the Manor to Richard's father, Richard was also able to sell the Manor to his brother Robert and by 1644 Robert was in control of Beches Manor. In 1642 Richard and Robert set up a charity for the relief of the poor of Wokingham as directed in their father's Will. The charity received several deeds to properties in the Wokingham area and in 1856 the lands were sold the charity received funds from the resulting investments.

Richard was not finished with academia and had an interest in medicine. After his father's death, he appears to have gone to Leyden and or Padua to train as a physician and there is evidence in his book *Zootomia* that he served as a physician during the Interregnum. Christopher Bentley feels "the mention in *Zootomia* of "Vexations" and "Experienced Torture" in connection with patients can be taken no other way". On July 9, 1643 Richard entered the Faculty of Law at the University of Leyden. Richard may have transferred to the Faculty of Medicine at Leyden or gone on to Padua but so far there is no record of Richard receiving a degree in Medicine.

By an indenture dated April 29, 1644 Richard sells the Manor of Beches to his brother, Robert Whitlock (1618-1671) a merchant in London. The document states: Richard Whitlock, Gent of All Souls College, Oxford in consideration of £300 and in consideration with Robert Whitlock merchant to levy a....of the Manor of Beaches, Holt House and other lands and premises therein mentioned to the use of the said Robert Whitlock and his heirs and assigns forever. This document confirms Richard was back at Oxford by 1644.

By 1647 Richard had married and over the next five years he and his wife Joane had at least three children. The first two daughters were baptized in London and their son James in Brightwell Baldwin in Oxfordshire in 1651.

In 1654 Richard published *Zootomia, or Observations on The Present Manners of the English Briefly Anatomizing the Living by the Dead, with an Useful Detection of the Mountebanks of Both Sexes*. Richard styles himself M.D. and Late Fellow of All Souls Oxford. For some time following this Richard is known as Doctor Whitlock.

In her Will dated November 10, 1657 Richard's Aunt Margery Whitlock leaves "my cousin Doct Richard Whitlock £5".

There is no record of Richard's life during the Interregnum other than what can be interpreted from his book *Zootomia*. Thomas a Wood somewhat maliciously records: After Mr. Whitlock had run with the times of Usurpation, he wheel'd about at the Restoration of K. C.II, took Holy Orders...

The Ely Episcopal Records show Rd. Whitlock Vicar of Foxton 1660.

In 1661 Richard was granted by the King the living of Stowe, Buckinghamshire and on September 13, 1662 the Dean and Chapter of Rochester presented him with the living of Ashford, Kent. It appears Richard did not get along well with his parishioners and an 18<sup>th</sup> century historian of Ashford records: This Mr. Whitlock was a man of Wit and Learning; He was a Strenuous Church of England man; I have heard there were unhappy differences between Him & His Parishioners; and indeed several of those Sentences which He wrote upon the Glass windows in the Parlour of the Vicarage-House do plainly enough intimate as much: There are other Sentences that do not so much look that way, but seem design'd as good Hints to the Reader to be retain'd in mind on the common occasions of Life.

Richard died at Ashford and was buried "by the North Door in the Porch" October 24, 1666 age 50. His Administration was granted to his wife Joane April 1, 1668. Thomas Ridsen, clerk of Ashford was bondsman of twenty pounds.

John Walker records: Some of his Family were afterwards Reduced to such Necessities, that they were forc'd to Sue for Charity of the same Corporation (Sons of the Clergy Corporation). In the Petition for that purpose, he is only said in general, to have been a Great Sufferer: Which Expression will, I presume, sufficiently warrant my Conjecture of his Sequestration.

The fact Richard given up his Fellowship at All Souls prior to 1654 could indicate his support of Cromwell was not as complete as Wood asserts and he would not have been subject to sequestration as he was not a minister during the Interregnum.

We know his daughter Anna went to live with her Uncle John Whitlock (1625-1708) the non-conformist Minister in Mansfield, Nottingham. Anna married the non-conformist Minister Thomas Langford in Mansfield May 16,1671.

Richard's son James Whitlock (1651-1716) is mentioned in his uncle Robert Whitlock (1618-1671)'s Will dated March 2,1670: "and to my Sister in Law Joane Whitlock Widow of my Brother Richard Whitlock Tenn pounds And to my Niece Anna Whitlock Daughter of my Brother Richard Tenn Pounds And to my Nephew James Whitlock Sonn of my Brother Richard Forty Shillings.

In his Will dated April 12, 1677 Nathaniel Herne bequeaths: "I give 20 shillings to.....Whitlock wife of .....Whitlock of Virginia, Daughter of my Brother Jno. Herne deceased. It has been assumed this was meant to say Dorothy Whitlock wife of James Whitlock but we have been unable to uncover the names of John Herne's children to determine if there was a daughter Dorothy. James was fifteen when his father died in 1666 and Richard did not leave his family well provided for. As noted above the family applied for relief from the Sons of Clergy Corporation.

While the Herne family was from London, several of them also went to Virginia including a John Herne. There is no record of James and Dorothy marrying in England and it is assumed the marriage took place in Virginia. We know from the Herne Will it was before 1677 and the couple were in Virginia by then. In the 1680's James Whitlock acts as attorney for his "kinsman" Anthony Whitlock heir to his cousin Thomas Whitlock (1615-1659) of Rappahannock Co., Virginia.

Richard Whitlock is an ancestor of the huge Virginia family that descends from his son James. Like his cousin Sir Bulstrode Whitelocke (1605-1675) he lived through the Interregnum under Oliver Cromwell and survived. His daughter Anna also had at least three children although we have yet to trace any descendants and the surname of Richard's wife Joane is still unknown. His legacy includes the book *Zootomia* published in 1654 with its wealth of insight into 17<sup>th</sup> century life. While there is some criticism that parts of his *Zootomia* mirror the earlier work *Anatomy* by Robert Burton it is noted this is only a small portion of the nearly 600 pages of Whitlock's book. He encourages reliance on science and analysis as opposed to quack and folk remedies. Richard's professionalism regarding the practice of medicine was ahead of its time.

Hopefully as more descendants get to know their Whitlock ancestors further research will be expand on what we have been able to learn so far.

## MARTHAVILLE, NATCHITOCHEs CO., LOUISIANA - by Kayla Langton

This is the story of Marthaville, Louisiana, starting with the founders, Martha Whitlock Rains and her husband John Jackson "J.J." Rains.

Martha grew up near Statesville, Tennessee, in Wilson County, about an hour drive to the southeast from Nashville. Her father, John R. Whitlock was born in Virginia Jan 25th, 1797. There is a record of a land deed dated Nov.10,1806 where John's parents are selling their land on Cheritree Creek, Halifax Co. and it is likely John came at this time to Tennessee with his parents. He was known much of his life as "Uncle Jackey", became a preacher in 1821 and spent all of his life in Wilson County, and nearby Warren County, Tennessee. He had 22 children by 2 wives - his first wife, Nancy (West) Whitlock died some time after the birth of their thirteenth child in 1839, then he married Minerva E. Brown who outlived him by many years. A story was written about him that you can see posted on Ancestry that states he obeyed the biblical command to "multiply and replenish the earth". There are a number of interesting postings about him. Martha's father John R. Whitlock is part of the WHITLOCK33 family that traces back to John Whitlock & Agnes delaBeche of Wokingham, Berkshire who were married about 1454.

John R. Whitlock's oldest daughter was born Martha Ann Whitlock on August 25th 1821, the same year her father was ordained in the Baptist church. She married John Jackson Rains on January 22, 1841 at the age of 19. This was something of a family legend because "J.J." was born October 22, 1825 - Martha was about 4 years older than him and note that he was 15 yrs, 3 mos old at the time of their marriage. The family story was that he was so mature that he was ready for marriage and the responsibility of a family. He had land and founded a town by the age of 26, so we can say it must have been true.

Martha and J.J. had twin daughters born nine months after they married, and went on to have 11 children. I do not know the story of exactly what year they moved to Louisiana, other cousins may have record of that and be able to fill that in. The 6th child was the first one born there in 1849, so we know they were there by then.

From Wikipedia & USGW Archives: Marthaville was founded in 1851. The founder, John Jackson Rains, named the town after his wife, Martha Ann (Whitlock) Rains. A school was built in 1853 and in 1855 a Post Office was added with J.J. Rains as the first postmaster. Marthaville was a stage stop for the Sheveport/Alexandria stage line by 1855. One of the Civil War battles occurred near Marthaville and the site is now a state commemorative area. The Hanson, Brazier and Rains families all established sawmills and brick kilns and shingle mills added to the industry of the town. The Rains family also ran a cotton gin and other mercantile enterprises in the town. In 1888 the "Martha's Bulletin" newspaper was launched.

During its peak, the town had a train stop, a bank, general store, bar, and hotel, etc. In the late 1960s, the railroad was removed and the town experienced an economic downturn. Now it is an unincorporated community, still having the store, post office, etc., and it is home to at least a dozen churches in the area in addition to an Elementary and Junior High school.



Martha is the only Whitlock buried in the Marthaville cemetery but there are lots of descendants there.

Other Whitlocks followed Martha to Marthaville. Martha's brother, Elisha Bell Whitlock, had a daughter Sarah Bell Whitlock (b. Nov 13, 1861) who had a son recorded in the family bible as Martin McHenderson Whitlock, known as "Mack" in his younger days, born in 1881. It appears Sarah was unmarried and Mack went by the last name of Whitlock in early life. He was born in Joplin, Missouri where Elisha's family had moved by that time. Note: In order not to confuse the researchers, Mack also went by several other names in his lifetime, one of them being Mack Monroe Whitlock. It was reported by one of his descendants that he was embarrassed by his mother and the circumstances of his birth. It is unknown where the names McHenderson or Monroe came from, it is possible they relate to his birth father, if he was given that information.

Sarah Bell Whitlock appears to have married a man by the name of Rogers in 1884. They had a daughter listed as Mandy Catherine "Dollie" Rogers in 1885. However, for some of her life she went by the name of Dollie K. Whitlock for unknown reasons, possibly Mr. Rogers was no longer around as a father. (not sure where the "K" came from unless it was misspelling of Catherine as Katherine in her records somewhere).

Dollie wound up in Marthaville, Louisiana near her great-aunt Martha's family. But Martha passed in 1898 and it is not known exactly when Dollie arrived there. She was living with a family named Hamner on the 1900 census for Marthaville and listed as the "adopted daughter" of Charles Hamner. When she marries John Bell Hart in 1901 she uses the last name Hamner on the marriage record. Her brother at the time went by his stepfather's name and is listed as Mack Rogers and also living in Marthaville in 1900 as well and listed as a worker with the Hamners. (Note: Dollie's great-aunt Susannah F. Whitlock married a John L. Hart and had 3 sons and 5 daughters. It is possible that John Bell Hart was a cousin.)

I am going to read between the lines here and guess that Martha may have died either right before Dollie got there or shortly thereafter and she had to find a place to live and means of support. My theory is that Dollie and Mack got jobs as household/farm help with the Hamner family. It is possible that they loved Dollie and then just claimed her as an adopted daughter since she was a teenager and had no parents in Marthaville.

Martha's nephew, son of her brother Anderson A. Whitlock, Anderson Whitlock, Jr, who went by Alex/Alec, also lived in Marthaville for a number of years. In some records it appears that Dollie also claimed her father was cousin Alex Whitlock at times as well. It could be that she needed to list a father at various times in her life since she moved around without parents and was young at the time.

It appears Alex made his fortune, so to speak, and moved to California, taking some family with him. By the 1910 census he is listed as a farmer/rancher in San Bernardino, CA, and there in 1920 and 1930. Many more Whitlocks moved out to California in the 1940s after WWII in the Modesto and Stockton areas. Note: if you google "Whitlock Ranch" on Google Maps you will find that it is in the San Bernardino area. Maybe some of our California cousins can tell us if any of that land is still in their family.

To make the family tree even more convoluted, I just discovered that J.J. and Martha's granddaughter, named Martha Duke, married my other great-grandmother's brother, Grover Cleveland Box.

Since Martha Whitlock Rains had 22 siblings and 11 children, there are a lot of Whitlock cousins out there directly from that line of the family! Martha Whitlock and J.J. Rains are my 3rd great-grandparents, and my grandparents and parents are buried just a few feet away from them in the Marthaville cemetery. My grandfather would have been eight years old when Martha passed away and almost certainly knew Dollie, Mack and Alec as well. But by the time my mother and uncle were old enough to remember, all of the cousins with the last name of Whitlock had moved away from the immediate area.

Note: most of the information on Dollie and Mack Whitlock was contributed by cousin Tammy Hart, granddaughter of Dollie. We found each other via DNA matches on Ancestry.com and have been corresponding via email for the last year. It has been a lot of fun making these new family discoveries.

# THE WHITLOCKS OF WOKINGHAM AND LONDON CHURCHES

Following his recent trip to England Harry Lee Whitlock put together a summary of his trip for his children and included details on each of the London churches that played a role in his ancestor's lives.

I have taken this concept to create a list of the basic details and family connections for each of the London churches that have connections to the Whitlocks of Wokingham family WHITLOCK02H. Hopefully this will be of interest to any descendants of John Whitloke and Agnes delaBeche who were married about 1454 and enable them to see actual places their ancestors would have been familiar with.

## **St Andrew, Holborn, Camden, London**

Richard Whitlock ( -1642) & Katherine Burchett the parents of Richard (1616-1666), are recorded in the parish records as having married 7 November 1615.

The church was rebuilt after the Great London Fire of 1666 and is one of the churches that architect Christopher Wren designed. The church is featured in Charles Dickens' novel Oliver Twist as the church whose bells the evil character Bill Sykes uses to tell time for planning and executing the robberies that Oliver and other kids are involved in. Charles Dickens supposedly attended this church, but there is not any indication of this in any Dickens biography.

## **St Botolph without Aldersgate**

John Whitlock (1652?-1695) the only son of Richard Whitlock (1614-1665) to survived the plague of 1665 lived in this parish and three of his children are baptized in this church, 1677-1683. John and his wife Elizabeth Taylor were booksellers near Stationers Hall and Elizabeth carried on the business after John's death in 1695.

## **St Brides, Fleet St., London**

The family had a house in Fleet Street before 1600 and Bulstode Whitelocke was born there August 6, 1605. Anthony Whitlock of Lambeth, Surrey, who inherited the Rappahannock, Virginia estate of his uncle Thomas Whitlock (1615-1659) was baptized at St.Brides October 18, 1657. Bulstode's son Stephen Whitelocke (1659-1688) was living in St. Brides parish when he made his Will in 1688.

## **St Catherine Coleman**

In his Will Dd Apr.30,1787 John Whitelocke of Marriage Hill, Rambury, Wiltshire states:

John born Mar.13,1758 Bapt. St. Catherine Coleman Ch. On Mar.22. Reg. As John Brown, Now known as John Whitelocke. This John Whitelocke became the Gen. John Whitelocke who was cashiered in 1808 for his part in the British losses in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1807.

Survived the fire of 1666 but was closed in 1926 and demolished shortly afterwards. It is now a public garden.

### **St Dunstan in the West, London**

John Hearne, was baptized at this church on 1 Jan 1630 by his father Nicholas Hearne. John Hearne is the father of Dorothy Hearne, who married James Whitlock (1651-1716), the Virginia immigrant

Sir James Whitlock was baptized here with his elder twin William born in Fleet Street, November 28, 1570. They were the posthumous sons of Richard Whitlock (1533-1570) who had died November 7, 1570 in Bordeaux, France. Richard's widow Joane is married to Thomas Price Nov. 5, 1571 in this church.

This church was rebuilt after the fire of 1666 but was left as ruins after the Blitz and is now a small London park.

Bulstrode Whitelocke (1605-1675) lived in this parish with his third wife Mary (Carleton) Wilson. Several of their children are baptized here 1651-1657.

This church dates from the 12th century and was not damaged during the 1666 fire or the Blitz.

### **St Michael Bassishaw**

All the family of the painter Richard Whitlock (1614-1665) the son of William & Ursula (Beresford) Whitlock except John & Ann died of the plague in July and August 1665 and were buried in this parish. William was Lord of the Manor of Beches who mortgaged the Manor to his brother Richard Whitlock ( - 1642) in 1617.

Another Sir Christopher Wren church but demolished in 1900. The Barbican Complex now occupies this land.

### St Nicholas Cole Abbey

Bulstrode Whitelocke's youngest son Stephen Whitelocke (1659-1688) married Hester Leche here May 25,1687.

Dates back to the 1100's. Destroyed in the fire of 1666 and rebuilt by Sir Christopher Wren. Underwent considerable reconstruction after the Blitz.

### St Peter Le Poer

All the children of Richard Whitlock ( -1642) & Katherine Burchett are baptized at this church 1616-1625. They were the parents of Richard Whitlock (1616-1666) and his brother Robert Whitlock (1618-1671). Robert was baptized in the church on 13 May 1618 as were his first six children with Mary Maddison 1646-1654. In 1644 Richard sold the Manor of Beches to his brother Robert for £300. Also John Whitlock (1625-1708) the non-conformist minister of Nottingham who Anna Whitlock (1647- ) went to live with after her father's death in 1666. It was Robert Whitlock's 1670 Will that held the clue to connect James Whitlock (1651-1716) to this family.

### St Peter Pauls Wharf

Bulstrode's eldest son James Whitelocke (1631-1701) married the Widow Mary (Pyke) Pitcher here June 18,1657. Mary had two small children by her previous husband. Bulstrode did not approve of the marriage that was promoted by his son's uncle Richard Benet. His Diary only records a party held the day before the wedding hosted by Richard Benet in which Bulstrode comments " Mrs. Pitcher carryed herselfe & was attended with more state then befitted her condition, att w[hi]ch Wh[itelocke] was lesse satisfied then before, that she would be a suitable wife for his son,, butt he was was too far engaged to her." In what is obviously a later revision to his Diary he records they were married about the 27<sup>th</sup> and notes "Mr. Rich[ard] Benet dealt unkindly afterwards w[ith] his Nephew." Also married at this church October 26, 1657 were the painter Richard Whitlock (1614-1665) & Mary Laurents who with most of their children died of the plague in St. Michael Bassishaw parish in 1665. [Note: in his Diaries Bulstrode Whitelocke refers to himself in the third person as "Wh"]

Destroyed in the fire of 1666 and not rebuilt, combined with St.Benet, Pauls Wharf.

## WILL OF STEPHEN WHITELOCKE of the SIX CLERKES OFFICE, LONDON 1688

**In the name of God Amen** I Stephen Whitelocke of Six Clerkes Office, gent being sick in body but of perfect memory thanks be to God Doe make this my last Will and Testament in manner and forme following. Impris first I give and bequeath my soule unto Almighty God trusting therein the merits Death and passion of my Redeemer Jesus Christ after this life shall be ended not to dye but to obtaine eternall life. My body I committ to the earth from whence it came to be buryed at the discretion of my Executrix hereafter named. Item for what worldly estate it hath pleased God to endow me with or bestow upon me after my Funerall expenses and debts paid and discharged I give and bequeath unto my deare and beloved wife Mrs. Hester Whitelock desiring her to give unto my brother John Whitelock a Ring with a lock of my haire in it Likewise to pay what I owe him in the first place before other debts are paid. Item to my sister Rose Leche a ring with a loke of my haire in it as a token of my love for kindnesse during sicknesse Lastly I doe hereby constitute and appoint the said Hester Whitelock sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament And I doe hereby revoke annull and make void all Wills whatsoever heretofore my me made. In witsesse whereof I the said Stephen Whitelock have hereunto sett my hand and seale this nineteenth day of May in the fourth yeare of the reigne of King James the Second anno Regis And .. Anno Domini One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Eight/ Stephen Whitelocke Signed sealed and published in the presence of Tho. Clarke, John Elford Elizabeth Elford./

**Octavo die mensis Julij Anno Dui Millimo Sextimo Octogenio Nono ...m't Como Johannis Whitelocke fratri naturali et ..timo et Crediori primi Stephani Whitelocke nuper parvia Ste. Bridgetta als Brides London defuncti habentis pr Ad ...id bona jura et credita dicti Defuncti juxta tenoreur et effectumi Testamenti ipsius defuncti ..quod Hestera Whitelocke Relicta dicti Defuncti et Executix in eodem Testamento nominat on... executonis Dicti Testamenti expresse renuniavit De bone et fideliter administand ead ad sancta Dei Evangelia Jurat.**

Stephen Whitelocke was the youngest of the seventeen children of Bulstrode Whitelocke (1605-1675) and this third wife Mary (Carleton) Wilson. Bulstrode records in his Diary for October 7, 1659 that "About 12 a clocke att night, Wh[itelockes] son Stephen was borne att his lodgings in Scotland Yard in Whitehall. Bulstrode was fifty-four and it was only days before the coup by the Army and the last few months of Interregnum prior to the restoration of King Charles II. Bulstrode's career as prominent Minister of the Government was almost at an end.

In December 1664 he records that his son Stephen "fell sicke of the smalle pox" but Ruth Spalding who edited the Diaries notes that due to the quick recovery of Bigley, John, Sam and Stephen the children may just have had chickenpox.

When Stephen was about five he dislocated his hip and Bulstrode records several entries in his Diaries regarding his attempts to correctly diagnose the problem and resolve it. The presence of plague in London was of concern at this time and in September 1666 the Great Fire of London burned both their houses, the one of Fleet Street and the leased premises near Temple Chamber. His son Bulstrode was in London at the time and managed to get two loads of their belongs out of the Fleet Street house but they lost everything else including many books and writings. In 1667 attempts to correct Stephen's hip were still on going.

At age ten Stephen travelled with his sister Frances and their mother Mary to Bath as Mary was ill and they spent a month in Bath for her health and returned in 1670 for further treatment. It is not clear if the issue of Stephen dislocated hip was ever resolved.

In his twenties Stephen went to work in the Six Clerks office in Chancery Lane near the Holborn end. He likely had received some legal training as the Clerks acted as attorneys for their clients looking to enrol commissions, pardons, patents warrants etc. Members had status in court as 'Sworn clerks' or 'clerks in court'.

At age 28 on May 25, 1687 Stephen married Hester Leche daughter of Sir William Leche, at St. Nicholas Cole Abbey, London and died a few months later in 1688 in St. Brides's parish, London. His Will was proved July 9, 1689. His widow Hester never remarried and lived until 1735 and died in Bath, Somerset. They had no children. See the December 2018 issue for Hester's Will.
