George Whitlock was born in Stockport, New York in November, 1847. His parents were Ephraim and Georgianna Dikeman Whitlock.

1850 census - George is listed as 3 years old living with his parents in Brooklyn, New York.

1860 census - George is not listed with his family in Hempstead, L.I, New York.

1862 - October 14, 1862 enlisted in army Company G. 159th Regiment as a private to serve during the Civil War. His occupation is listed as a farmer. His age is listed as 18. However, he was going to be 15 the following month. He received a disability discharge on March 22, 1863 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He re enlisted on March 3, 1864 (serving as a substitute for Robert B. Sherman) and again listed his age as 18 and his occupation as a farmer from Stockport, New York. He served in Company I, 54th Regiment of the New York State Volunteers. According to his discharge papers he was 5'5" tall, had fair complexion, blue eyes. One document lists his hair as sandy and the other as red. He was discharged on April 14, 1866 in Charleston, South Carolina. The family was always under the impression that he was at the Battle of Gettysburg. However, after checking his records, he was not in the army at the time of the Battle. The 54th regiment was at the Battle of Gettysburg.

1870 census - George and Mary Jane Clark were married at that time. George was 23 and a Carpenter and Mary Jane was 24 and a Homemaker. They lived in a town called Claverack in the County of Columbia, New York. Both of them were born in New York.

He married Mary Jane Clark and they had two daughters, Viola Margaret Whitlock who was my grandmother, my dad's mother, and Alice Whitlock (who at a young age was adopted by Bartley and Mary Van Bramer). According to the Camden, NJ City Directory of 1876-1877, the family was living at 501 Berkley Street. Ken and I checked out the location in Camden and there are just empty lots and old warehouse type buildings at this time. However, from riding around some other streets, it probably once was a very nice neighborhood. A United Methodist Church and school are located on the corner of Berkley and Broadway. According to records from the State of NJ Alice was born in Camden, NJ and her parents were George and Mary Jane Clark Whitlock. At that time George's occupation was listed as a house carpenter.

The 1880 census places, George, his second wife, Elizabeth McGreedy from Pottsville, PA. and daughter Viola in Jersey City, NJ. At that time Alice had already been adopted and on the 1880 census is listed as the adopted daughter of the Van Bramers living in Ghent Town, Columbia County, NY.

Newspaper dated April 8, 1890 states that policeman are electioneering for an increase in pay. If they win, the salary will be \$1,000 per year.

Hoboken Directory - 1902-1903 lists George E. Whitlock as a policeman living at 212 8th Street.

George passed away on September 2, 1921 and is buried at Flower Hill Cemetery in North Bergen, New Jersey.
