Of the Republican Mass Meeting held at the Court House in Ste. Genevieve, Mo., on Saturday, March 29th, 1884. The meeting was called to order by Mr. J.S. WHITLOCK, Chairman of the County Central Committee, who on motion of Mr. T.B. WHITLEDGE, was made permanent chairman of the meeting;
Moved and carried that P.A. MENARD be made Secretary of meeting.

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On motion of Mr. WHITLEDGE, Messrs. Wm. H. BANTZ and P.A. MENARD were appointed delegates to attend the State Convention at Sedalia, Mo., and Messrs. L.D. THURMAN and C. BAUM were appointed delegates to attend the Congressional Convention at St. Louis, MO.

Mr. Gustavus ST. GEM then moved that the chairman appoint two alternatives for State and two for Congressional Conventions. The motion was carried and Messrs. T.B. WHITLEDGE and Val. ROTTLER were appointed alternatives for the State and Messrs. Anton ECKERT and Fred. JOHNSON for the Congressional Convention.

On motion of Mr. WHITLEDGE, the Central Committee now serving, was to continue for two years.

Moved and carried that the meeting adjour sine die.
