In researching an article for the Cigar History Museum about Old Virginia Cheroots Google led me to your Whitlock Family Newsletter vol. 24 #4 and found valuable information for my article.

However, I also came across an error which I am confident you will wish to correct. In the article on Philip it says in small wooden boxes with a stylized portrait of "Uncle Phil" as their Trade Mark.

The illustration cited is not Uncle Phil but of Uncle Remus, a copy of his 'portrait' that appeared in the first edition of Joel Chandler Harris's book.

Put them side by side and you will have no doubt that is true. Uncle Remus (unidentified on OVC label) was selcted by Philip as the central figure on all

Old Virginia Cheroots boxes and was so well known/recognized in the US that both American and Lorillard continued using the illustration

on a blue background just as Philip Whitlock had originated...until the brand was discontinued around 1940.

Do you know when and why Philip went into the cigar-making business...? When he began making Old Virginia Cheroots?

Thank you for your efforts and the information you have provided in your publication.

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The book was published in 1881, very successful: Uncle Remus, His Songs and His Sayings: The folklore of the Old Plantation.

A brief, one page, story about OVC and Uncle Remus providing the original book illustration is in the Winter 2009 CIGAR MAGAZINE.

Here are two 1880s illustrations from the cigar museum's (my) collection. Whether Philip or the Levy Brothers copied him first, and whether either got permission, is unknown. I'm sorry, but I've never bothered to find out who the original illustrator for Harris's book was...who was responsible for the iconic image. I'll have to try for my OVC article.
