

Frye's Island Sale Sees Heavy Bidding

Frye's Island, about three miles out from Blacks Harbour, N.B. was bought at auction at St. Stephen last Thursday afternoon by A. Neil McLean of St. John, president of Connors Bros., Ltd., Blacks Harbour fish canning plant, for \$51,200. Mr. McLean stated that he would apply to Fredericton at once for a charter to incorporate a company which would start at once to develop the fishing of the island. He announced that he would organize a company immediately and have the island surveyed and put in first-class condition as a fishing ground. The new company would be separate from the Connors firm, he said.

Bay of Fundy Granite Co. Under New Control

The four local granite mills have recently resumed operations after the winter shut-down and a good year is anticipated by the various companies.

The Bay of Fundy Company, for the first time in its history, is controlled by local capital, Arthur Stewart, who has been with the Epps Co., for twenty years, along with Dr. C.C. Alexander, have secured control, these two purchasing the stock owned by the heirs of the late Julius T. Whitlock and John M. McDougall, Mr. Stewart is manager.

This company owns a number of the finest red granite quarries in this vicinity and plans for enlargement are entertained.

O'Brien & Baldwin and H. McGratton & Sons will be under the same management as that of last year.

Creamery made over sixty tons

On Monday, May 14, the County Creamery completed one operation. Since that date one 120,000 and some odd pounds of cream have been manufactured from supplied by farmers of Charlotte County. The total amount has been sold in the local markets of St. St. Andrews, St. George, Mill Grand Manan and Deer Island. This amount has not been sufficient to meet the year round consumption of these markets. In other words Charlotte County does not produce enough to supply its own population throughout the year. Therefore, the question of dairymen need give little concern to who are planning an extension of dairying operations.
