was proved at London the twenty
and day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand
one hundred and ninety two before the Right Honourable
Sir William Heyne Knight Doctor of Laws Master of the
Company of the Proportioners of London
having constituted by the Testes of Grand Blanks and
Normans Salmon the Executors named in the will of
the several Effects to his Effects in the Public Funds &
and other Goods chattels and credits in the Kingdom of
England to whom Administration was granted for his
purpose aforesaid but no further or otherwise having
ever first sworn by Commission July to Administer.

In the Name of God Amen Isabell Whillcock
of Isabell Whillcock Spinster of 90. Bishopsgate in the Parish
of Saint Luke Cripplegate and County of Middlesex being
of sound disposing Mind Memory and Understanding
doe by God for the same calling to mind the mortality
of this mortal life do make this my last will and
testament in manner following I sign my said will to its
in all humble way of its future happenings and
the disposal of a being infinitely good as to me
in my will as least it to be buried in a decent manner

at the duration of my levetown in manor house
 puts into the same grave with me my good bed
 worth value of hundred pounds or to my widow
 and effects which it will please God to give me
 after all legal debts and demands upon me made
 as also my funeral expenses discharged by my executors
 to give and bequeath to my cousin Charles Edward
 Whitchurch four hundred and fifty pounds four pence
 shillings and pence consolidated summed up also out of my chattels
 furniture plate silver and china as are not demanded
 bequeathed by me also my books not otherwise disposed of
 by me also to give and bequeath to my cousin Elizabeth
 Patterson wife of Mr Chapman Patterson of 200 acres
 forty four hundred and fifty pounds four pence due
 consolidated summed also the four hundred and
 two shillings in the two pair of stairs for room
 my family pictures with the history of the same
 also to give and bequeath to my brother Edward
 of my cousin Charles Edward Whitchurch my house
 Gower and what land if she should be in London at the
 time of my decease to consist unto Mary Ann
 during my living appear to the best of their
 judgment & to whom my three cousins required
 Charles Whitchurch Patterson my cousin William of
 Saint Edmunds bury Suffolk and my cousin Mary
 Whitchurch of Mrs Whitchurch said to absent and in the
 County Kent Mrs Alice Oliver to divide them herself also to
 give to my cousin William of Saint Edmund
 in the three per cent redwood annuity fifty pounds a year
 Mrs Chapman Patterson in trust fifty pounds due in
 the three per cent redwood annuity for the use of my
 cousin Mary Whitchurch also to give and bequeath to
 Mrs Elizabeth wife of Mr James Hoby of Saint John
 Clerkenwell Cheshire hundred pounds lawfull
 money to be paid out of the three per cents redwood
 annuity also to give and bequeath to my God daughter
 Mrs Beale the off hand forty one hundred and fifty
 pounds more in the three per cent redwood annuity
 together with my Gold Watch also to give to her
 Mrs Margaret Pitts Rector my hundred and fifty
 pounds due in the three per cents redwood annuity also
 to give to Mrs Isabella Rivers wife of Mr Richard Rivers
 of Mortament at Holmwood in the County of Surrey
 ten pounds due in the three per cents reduced
 annuity also to give to Mrs Susanna Sturman of
 Brompton Row Middlesex twenty pounds due in
 the three per cents reduced annuity also to give and
 bequeath to my servant Susanna Sturman if she
 continues in my service till my decease fifty pounds
 lawfull money to be paid her by my Executors at the
 rate of five pounds a year till the fifty pounds
 paid but if a proposal of marriage is made her

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over said Person with the consent of my Executors
and many is intended to begin before him and in the
first case my Executors may determine the residue of the
fifth termes least remans unpaid also such of my
Womans apparel at Whitlock and Mrs Dannahill Ellwood
shall paye suitable and propo for her Also I give and

newfield house & now raine in the 13 situate in the
Whitlock place together with all the fishponds such as -
Linton Ranges Upper before and above created for the
time of his and his wifes natural life afterwards if any
of his heirs should remain unpaired to go to Charles
Edward Whitlock Also I give to her son John Ellwood
in my name and charge pence and pounds in the
proportion together with my books, bibles, bound bibles
and pocket on the same Testament also I give an
estate to Daniel Ellwood wife of the above named
John Ellwood one hundred pounds legadimony to be
paid her out of the thre pence reward annuity and
my will is that these my legacies be paid by my Executors
within three months after my death and by my
Executor and appoint the aforementioned John Ellwood of
the field Ridgway and Cliffton parishes of Edington
my Executors of this my last will and Testament here by
writing and making his all other will or testam.
intoper my memory and so than this to be my last
will and Testament as above written for ever witness
whereas I am now in my 80th year and doth this 2nd day
of October in the year of our Lord one thousand
one hundred and ninety two Isabella Whitlock
doth declare and declare by the Testam. as and for
her last Will and Testament in the presence of us
at our request and in her presence have subscribed our
names as witnesses thereto. William Dingham & Thos.

This Will was proved at London the nineteenth
day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand
one hundred and ninety two before the Worshipful William
Damer Esq. of Law and Surrogate of the Right Honourable
William Wyndham Bright also Doctor of Laws Proctor
Esq. or Commissary of the Progotation Court of Canterbury
lawfully constituted by the said Dr. John Ellwood and

was granted of all and singular the Goods chattels and
real estate of his said Testator having been first shown duly
examined.

21 days my funeral expenses remaining in my estate
+ were paid by my widow in my care however
I think he gave me only one hundred dollars
short time before him and China as we not
having been buried and fifty pounds for
my use also my books not otherwise accounted
for at his wife of Mr. Chapman for his
own sum buried and fifty pounds from his next estate
was established among his old friends and relatives
and sumittance in New Mexico of stones for room
and fittings with the history of the stones
of my cousin Charles E. and his wife Mrs.
Gowen and what was if any known to me
things of my grandfather and his wife Mrs. Anna Chapman
including my learning up past to the best of her
knowledge of the same and her cousin Charles
and his wife Mrs. Anna Chapman daughter of my
sister Elizabeth and my cousin John
Carroll her son who died in absent and in his
place to my widow in the same amount
in her name is a receipt rendered January 21

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to us without payment. His treatment of us
and our wife is beyond words. His residence of two
years and his constant employment has been
also such of very
little value to him. He has no animal, clothes
or furniture to live on. He has friends in the
country of his residence, but they
are few and mostly are no longer in
employment. There are also other families in the
village of his wife and son above. Friends for the
rest of his life after we return to our
home and I sincerely beg you to have some place allowed
us to live in and to give us presents and
provisions to get us through our
present situation. On this note I shall
conclude. Please excuse my long letter
but it is hard to get out of here and
I trust you will do your best to help us.
