

Our History

Whitelocks, or its true name, "Turks Head" had its first license granted in 1715, though the actual building dates back even further.

The name Whitelocks comes from a family called Whitelock who held the license for 90 years. John Lupton Whitelock was the first member of the family to hold the license, followed by William Henry Whitelock, who was then the youngest licensee in the city. William Henry was followed by Lupton Whitelock, who had a national reputation as a flautist, and under him the bar became the centre for bohemian life in the city.


In 1886 John Lupton Whitelock altered the bar and restaurant into what it is today, little or no change, having, taken place in the last 100 years. This is helped by a preservation order on both the outside and inside of the building. In Lupton's time an Irish giant was employed as a doorman, for at one time a dinner jacket had to be worn to enter the bar. Women were not allowed to stand at the bar so waiters were employed to serve. Dwarfs were employed for this purpose.

Whitelocks was the first establishment to have electricity and an electric clock. As an added attraction there were Hollywood-type search lights at each end of the passage, which tracked across the sky with a strong beam of light.

The prices at that time were stable enough to be engraved on the bar mirrors: Sausages and Potatoes 3d; Cheese and Biscuits 1d or Pies 2d.

Percy Whitelock took over before the Second World War, and finally in 1944 it was sold to Scottish and Newcastle Breweries bringing to an end the Whitelocks reign, though leaving their truly unique and beautiful Luncheon Bar. . . and perhaps, the ghost that haunts the Turks Head.

Scottish and Newcastle Breweries converted the old engravers shop which was situated at the top of the passage into what is now the top bar and kept the decor in keeping with the rest of Whitelocks.
